Over 70 people were present including Mr. Horsey, Miss Jessie, and both Vice-Presidents. After an excellent dinner, Mr. Horsey, proposing a toast to Mr. and Mrs. Dames, the College, and its future welfare and happiness, expressed his pleasure at seeing so many Old Boys present. He said the strength of a school lay not only in the school itself but in its Old Boys' Association, and he would like to thank the Hon. Secretary of the Club for the work he had done. Mr. Dames in thanking Mr. Horsey reminded everyone that the Committee had wisely decided against speech-making on this occasion and he hoped everyone would go ahead and enjoy themselves. Dancing then commenced and continued until 11 p.m., when, regretfully, a very enjoyable evening was brought to a close. The generosity of Mr. Mee, in presenting a bottle of whisky to be raffled, resulted in £5:10:0 being raised for the War Memorial Fund. The Fund now stands at £105:12:0.

got a los on the stant The following is an extract from a letter sent by Capt. H. Davies (1933-37) at present stationed in: H.Q. West African Command, Accra, Gold Coast. It may be of interest to members.

"There is a great demand for Europeans in all Colonies, both in Colonial and trading companies, and mining. In the majority no training is required or can all be done out here. Minimum civilian pay: £600 a year, tax free; On top of which colonial service and companies provide a bungalow and servants. In the Gold Coast of Nigeria the climate is good. It is never as hot or as humid as India or the Far East. Suggested trades are: Colonial Service; Agricultural Branch; Accountants. V.A.C., General trading; mining; any engineering experience. Families fare well out here. Malaria and yellow fever, nil." Capt. Davies will be glad to answer any queries addressed to him.
